
UIMF Hosts Parallel Event at 65th session of the Commission on the Status of Women



On the morning of March 22, 2021, at 6am MST, members of the Utah International Mountain Forum, (UIMF), a coalition of student clubs at Utah Valley University, (UVU), had the opportunity to participate in the 65th session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW65). They hosted through Student Engaged Learning (SEL) the parallel event titled, *"Mountain Women Empowerment Through The Inclusive Student-Engaged Learning Model,"* which was co-sponsored by the Russian Academy of Natural Sciences (RANS), a non-government organization in general consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), and the UVU Global Engagement Office. For the first time ever it was done virtually because of COVID-19.

Prior to the event, students at UVU worked diligently together through SEL to prepare for this highest gender-focused forum of the United Nations. SEL encourages students to gain professional skills while addressing real-world issues on local and international levels with university faculty serving as mentors. Through our initiatives, we seek to raise awareness among the local and international communities about the necessity to join efforts of global mountain communities and activities of international organizations, like the United Nations, with the aim to promote improvements of the lives of the mountain people, their families, and gender issues both in the Rocky Mountains and worldwide. SEL presents an academic program uniquely distinguishing UVU among other academic institutions both in the State of Utah and in North America.

Our parallel event advocated for mountain women, girls, and families, who are among the poorest and most neglected on national and international levels. According to the Food and Agriculture Organization of the UN, over ninety percent of individuals residing in the mountains live in developing countries counting more than 634 million located in rural areas in which the predominant share live in poverty. These vulnerable mountain communities are marginalized, underrepresented, and essentially ignored in policy making. Their situation is worsened, and their circumstances compounded by modern challenges such as food insecurity, climate change, and out-migration. As a major contribution to this advocacy campaign, since 2007, UVU under the umbrella of the Mountain Partnership and FAO-UN has regularly hosted international Women of the Mountains Conferences.

In 2015, the fourth International Women of the Mountains Conference was hosted for the first time by UIMF through SEL in Utah and highlighted by the UN Secretary General's report on SMD A/74/209, from 22 July 2019, the only student group internationally. Therefore, since 2016 for the UIMF delegations it was and continue to be an important priority to both promote decisions and recommendations about mountain women and families of the WOMC 2015 by participating at CSW61, CSW62, CSW63, CSW64 and advocating for the inclusion of language about mountain women and communities in the final document of those highest gender-focused forums of the United Nations. Unfortunately, it did not happen yet due to which the UIMF delegation made a new attempt to reach this goal during CSW65.

As part of SEL implementation, the visit provided an opportunity for Samuel Elzinga, President of UIMF due to his graduation from UVU to transfer the power to me as a vice-President of UIMF: I lead the delegation, while Samuel advised me when necessary as its member. As a result, I coordinated all student members of the delegation activities through a task list, which contained assignments affiliated with logistics, protocol, communications, design, both due dates and the dates when assignments were accomplished in addition to contact information for each student.

As the first step in preparations for CSW65, UIMF members researched and jointly prepared and then provided in October 2020 for the consideration a draft of a written statement to the Russian Academy of Natural Sciences and Utah-China Friendship Improvement Sharing Hands Development and Commerce, (UCFISHD&C), two NGOs in consultative status with

ECOSOC. According to the United Nations rules with NGOs accreditation, they are eligible to submit for the approval of the ECOSOC their statement for any UN forum with their attendance. On December 13, 2020, the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) of the United Nations approved the *written statement* co-sponsored by both of them for the 65th session of the commission on the status of Women (CSW65). The statement was distributed as an official document of the UN and urged the Commission to have mountain women and girls in the focus of the 2030 Development Agenda. The statement also highlighted the role of the SEL model developed at UVU for students' professional growth, building ties with NGOs like RANS and UCFISHD&C, and advocacy of SMD agenda and mountain women in particular.

An important task for our visit was preparations of our statements during the parallel event, which took a lot of time and effort. This was a very long procedure which required weekly meetings to discuss content for each member of the delegation. Each of them were in need to learn how to integrate in one page document main points about the SEL model and its ability to advocate the mountain women also personal contributions from each member. I was responsible to finalize the draft with the approval of UIMF mentor, Dr. Baktybek Abdrisaev.

One of the important priorities was also for our members to engage in the visit local community groups and in particular Orem Rotary Club, which partners with UVU Rotaract club during several semesters. Due to that, UIMF members participated in a special *fundraising* organized by Orem Rotary with selling Oranges, which provided funds also to cover some expenses for our visit.

Another important and interesting activity for members of our delegation was the participation in a series of preparatory events for CSW65 organized by NGO/CSW-NY. I provided schedules of events to members and many of them were able to attend Youth Activists: <u>Effective</u> <u>Advocacy in International Fora</u>, <u>Presentation Skills Workshop</u>, <u>UN Advocacy Training</u>; as well as the events <u>Climate Crisis and Climate Action by and for Women</u> and <u>CSW65 Chair Address to</u> <u>NGOs</u>, and learn how to be effective advocacy professionals at the United Nations. Therefore, when the day of the parallel event arrived on Monday, March 22, 2021, all members of the delegation knew already what was expected from them.

According to the agenda of the event, which we designed with UIMF members, I opened the floor by *providing welcoming remarks* and showcased Utah as one of the promising examples in Sustainable Mountain Development. This activity is also an important reminder of the pioneers and women who contributed to building the SMD model that citizens now enjoy. In preparation for the event, I fundraised with UVU Rotaract, aided students in developing their statements, organized the event, and contributed significant time to research and other preparations.

As part of the event, Samuel Elzinga showed the audience a short video with his and two peers' oral presentations at the High-Level Political Forum in 2018 to remind UIMF efforts in advocating SMD at the UN. At the end of the parallel event we showed another video that acknowledged and featured the students at the founding of the UIMF and their preparations to host WOMC 2015. Each student presenter and VIP also were given the opportunity to answer relevant questions during a Q&A session.
